Alameda County Working Smarter for Our Children

We are all familiar with the cliché, "children are our future." These are words that we hear often. In Alameda County there are close to 2,600 children and youth in foster care and in need of the support and security of a family. These are children who need stable homes. The Alameda County Department of Children and Family Services has partnered with faith-based organizations and community-based organizations throughout Alameda County and created the initiative, "A Pathway to Home." The goal of the program is to license an additional 400 county foster homes and provide permanent adoptive homes for children and youth in foster care.

Returning Formerly Incarcerated Youth to Our Communities: A Progressive Idea or a Wolf in Sheep's Clothing?

The California Juvenile Justice System has been under attack for their lack of effective treatment and service provision for our incarcerated youth. The figures are staggering and the recidivism rate statewide for wards of the California Youth Authority (CYA) is 70% and for Alameda County the figure is 36%. In addition a series of damaging reports released by the National Council on Crime and Delinquency exposes the over usage of drugs as a method of doping up the young people instead of providing comprehensive treatment for serious psychological issues. The wealth of damaging information about the treatment of young people at CYA has fueled a movement to have them returned to their respective county in California.
