On December 5, 2013, "World Citizen" Nelson Mandela passed on. I send my thoughts and prayers to his family and the people of South Africa. I wish to celebrate what he taught us by example: to never give up on your principles, your goals, your vision. He taught us that one person or a small committed group can and will make a difference. He taught us about love—love of yourself, and love for your people—that will affect everyone around you. I was transformed and the world was transformed by his strength and his ability to not be consumed by hate but to turn hate into love.



Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela (July 18, 1918 – December 5, 2013

Nelson Mandela taught us to turn every situation into a learning opportunity. While at Robben Island, he and other leaders of the African National Congress turned their site of incarceration into a place of learning, a university, a place that in fact gave fuel to the revolution in South Africa.

Along with others in the United States, I was arrested fighting apartheid, introduced local policies to divest from companies that were doing business in South Africa, and was a lead organizer for Nelson Mandela's first and only visit to the Bay Area on June 30, 1990. At the time, I was an aide to former Congressman Ronald V. Dellums, author of the first anti-apartheid legislation in the United States Congress.

I had the opportunity to meet Nelson Mandela and in 1994, our office organized the largest and only celebration in the Bay Area when Nelson Mandela became the first Black President of South Africa. I will continue to be guided by the ideals for which Nelson Mandela fought and sacrificed. The world is a better place because Nelson Mandela lived!

Youth Ancestral Project Update

In a small classroom on the second floor of Congregation Beth El in Berkeley last fall, a handful of students and a local genealogist pored over photocopied sheets of old census records, searching for clues about their ancestors. The class was part of the Youth Ancestral Project, a program initiated by Supervisor Carson in February 2011 to empower youth to connect with their ancestral roots through intergenerational dialogue, research, and storytelling.

Since the initial classes began, the project has expanded to reach youth in the Jewish, Asian, and Latino communities, as well as youth who participate in Alameda County Probation Department's Weekend Training Academy and the Beyond Emancipation program for former foster youth.

In 2012 and 2013, the project was managed by local non-profit Alternatives in Action with funding from the Alameda County Health Care Services Agency School Health Services Coalition. Expert support has come from staff and volunteer genealogists from the African American Genealogical Society of Northern California, the San Francisco Bay Area Jewish Genealogical Society, the California Genealogical Society, and the Oakland Family History Center.

Alameda County Encourages Healthy Nail Salon Practices Program Protects Workers and Customers

Alameda County's Healthy Nail Salon Recognition Program (HNSRP) recognizes local businesses that protect the health of their employees, customers, and the environment by using less toxic products. Participating salons use only nail polishes that do not contain toluene, formaldehyde or dibutyl phthalate. These chemicals have been linked to reproductive and developmental issues, cancer, and neurological and respiratory problems.

Alameda County Environmental Health staff provide salons with health and safety trainings that help business owners improve air quality and ventilation.

Benefits of participating in the voluntary program include formal recognition as a Healthy Nail Salon and a listing on the Alameda County website. There are more than 350 salons and roughly 1,000 workers who provide a variety of nail services within Alameda County. Seven nail salons have been officially recognized as Healthy Nail Salons in Alameda County.

In District 5, Alameda County has recognized Fashion Nails, located at 1821 University Avenue, Berkeley, CA 94703.

Many nail salon workers in California are women from the Vietnamese community who may have barriers to access to health information and care. Studies of nail technicians suggest a higher risk of work-related health problems, including respiratory issues, skin problems, headaches, and neurological, developmental and reproductive harm.

Application Deadline: Wednesday, March 5, 2014 Free Grant Workshops Presented in January and February 2014

The Alameda County Arts Commission announces the release of the 2014 ARTSFUND Grants Program Application Packet for Alameda County-based nonprofit organizations. Information can be found at the Arts Commission website <u>http://acgov.org/arts</u> (click on "Programs"). Standard grants awards are \$1,000 each. The application deadline is March 5, 2014.

The ARTSFUND Grants Program supports all types of arts programming such as dance, literature, media arts, music, theater, visual arts, and multidisciplinary arts programs presented in Alameda County by Alameda County nonprofit organizations. Last year's ARTSFUND program awarded grants of \$1,000 to \$2,500 to 48 nonprofit organizations throughout Alameda County. During the 2014 funding cycle, between 40-50 arts organizations may be awarded grants. The Alameda County Arts Commission, a division of the County of Alameda, is dedicated to improving the quality of life in Alameda County by nurturing a thriving environment for the arts, promoting economic opportunities for Alameda County's artists and arts organizations, and encouraging public participation in the arts.

The Arts Commission staff will host three free workshops to assist organizations in preparing their grant applications. Reservations are required. Workshops will be held on Wednesday, January 15 from 3:00 p.m. – 4:30 p.m. at the Fremont Main Library in Fremont; Wednesday, January 22 from 3:00 p.m. – 4:30 p.m. at the Alameda County Lakeside Plaza Building in Oakland; and Wednesday, February 5 from 6:00 – 7:30pm at the Livermore Community Center, Livermore.

More than 300 East Bay youth have been touched by the Youth Ancestral Project, inspiring intergenerational dialogue, increased self-esteem, and a deeper sense of family identity.

In the fall of 2012, the project came to Berkeley's Midrasha, a weekend educational program for 8th–12th graders cosponsored by Congregation Beth El and nine other synagogues. Janice Sellers, an Oakland resident and expert in Jewish genealogy, led the students in weekly explorations of the meaning of family; interviewing and research skills; and personal identity in the multicultural, religiously diverse Bay Area.

In a session devoted to Internet research, soft-spoken 9th grader Zach sat down at the computer and typed in the name of his maternal grandmother, Jane Barthold. In the California Birth Index, a record popped up for Jane Scott Barthold, a woman born in San Francisco in

1938. Although the listed day of her birth was a few days off from the date Zach was given by his mother, he thought he might have found his grandmother. Zach then tried finding her on the 1940 census, with no luck. "Maybe she doesn't exist!" he joked.

In conversations with his father, Zach learned for the first time that his Jewish relatives emigrated from Belarus and his grandfather worked for Ford at a factory in Michigan.

In the closing session, Zach reported that he learned he could visit the Oakland History Room at the Oakland Public Library to dig deeper into his family story. "Are there apps for genealogy?" he asked. Janice and Project Coordinator Nicka Smith smiled and answered, "Oh,

yes!"

"This class got the students thinking about family, so they are now interested in passing on the stories family members have told them," remarked Janice. "The research stimulated conversations between younger and older generations and a curiosity about heritage."

In the Spring of 2013, high school students in the Life in Science City after-school program at Life Academy in East Oakland worked with their teacher Sam Garcia to develop an ancestral program that incorporated research about genetics and a youth-generated census of

their classmates.

After investigations into their own family history, students designed a survey that would create a snapshot of life in Oakland in 2013. The students carefully crafted questions about gender, race, family members, height, weight, eye and hair color, sexual orientation, health, social and sexual behavior, and educational plans. The young people implemented the anonymous survey through school-day science classes and plan to create a time capsule display in the new wing of their school to memorialize the results of their census for future family members and researchers.

The student leaders at McClymonds High School in West Oakland participated in the Youth Ancestral Project for the third time in Spring 2013 and took their projects to a whole new level. Many of the students took DNA tests to discover from what regions of the world their DNA originates.

"No matter where you go, as long as you are with your family, you are home," shared Kailah Simone Johnson-Bryant, who discovered she is 86% African and the rest Asian and European. "There's never a need for reunion because a little piece of them will always be with you." Kailah discovered that her great grandfather Ambrose Johnson was born in Mississippi in 1918, became a radio technician and was chased out of the state in 1951 after he started helping Blacks register to vote.

For their final presentation, the McClymonds youth created a panoramic family history timeline in the dance studio at the McClymonds Youth and Family Center. Family and community members streamed through the exhibit, some quietly reading descriptions of family and historical events while others excitedly chatted about familiar photos.

Across the city at the Oakland Family Search Library and Family History Center, youth from the Alameda County Probation Department's Weekend Training Academy arrive every other Saturday to perform community service and learn about their family history with the help of the friendly library volunteers. Although these youth, a diverse group from all around the County, have only two or three sessions to dig into their past, many of them have found surprising or valuable information about their families.

Project organizers are currently creating a documentary



BART Alert: Fare Increase January 1, 2014
